# Population<sup>1</sup>

- Anaheim is the 1st most populous city in Orange County: 336,265
- Anaheim has the 2nd greatest youth (0-17) population when compared to other OC cities: 91,917
- Ethnic breakdown: 27.5% White; 52.8% Hispanic; 14.6% Asian; 2.4% Black; 2.7% Other
- Median Family Income: \$63,180 ([Orange County: \$85,009] [U.S. Census Bureau: 2011 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates])

#### **Social Services**

- Anaheim children receiving financial assistance through CalWORKs<sup>2</sup>: 10,658
  - Representing 22.95% of the 46,429 child recipients county-wide (12/1/2011)
- Child Abuse and neglect reports on children received from Anaheim in 2013: 6,857
  - Representing 17.3% of the 39,594 reports received county-wide

### **Child Abuse and Neglect Report Details**

- The majority of the 6,857 reports came from mandated professions (85%);Counselor/Therapist (23%), School Personnel/Teachers (19%), Other Professionals combined (22%), Law Enforcement (19%), and SSA, Probation, other Government Agency (18%). Non-mandated but concerned parties (including relatives) made 1,010 reports, equal to 15% of the total.
- The 6,857 report-allegations represent 4,841 distinct children<sup>3</sup> in Anaheim, by Gender & Age:

## **Extended Foster Care (EFC) Program: Non-Minor Dependents**

- The EFC Program, created by Assembly Bill 12 in January, 2012, allows foster youth to receive foster care benefits and services after age 18 and up to age 21. These young adults remain under the jurisdiction of the court and supervision of the county as they transition to independence.
- There are 19 Non-Minor Dependents residing within the city of Anaheim as of 12/31/2013

#### How can the Anaheim Community help to Preserve and Reunite their Children and Families?

- Support community-based responses to protect children and preserve families
- Become a resource family and encourage others to do so (short or longer term foster care)
- Participate in team decision making meetings that bring together people to help children at risk
- Provide space for foster care orientation, training or family visitation
- Help with community mentoring for birth parents working towards reunification
