## Population<sup>1</sup>

- Stanton is the 25th most populous city in Orange County: 38,186
- Stanton has the 24th greatest youth (0-17) population when compared to other OC cities: 10,566
- Ethnic breakdown: 21.8% White; 50.8% Hispanic; 22.8% Asian; 1.8% Black; 2.7% Other
- Median Family Income: \$53,968 ([Orange County: \$85,009] [U.S. Census Bureau: 2011 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates])

## Social Services

- Stanton children receiving financial assistance through CalWORKs<sup>2</sup>: 949
  - Representing 2.04% of the 46,429 child recipients county-wide (12/1/2011)
- Child Abuse and neglect reports on children received from Stanton in 2013: 513
  - Representing 1.3% of the 39,594 reports received county-wide

## Child Abuse and Neglect Report Details

- The majority of the 513 reports came from mandated professions (88%); Counselor/Therapist (25%), School Personnel/Teachers (22%), Other Professionals combined (26%), Law Enforcement (11%), and SSA, Probation, other Government Agency (17%). Non-mandated but concerned parties (including relatives) made 62 reports, equal to 12% of the total.
- The 513 report-allegations represent 389 distinct children<sup>3</sup> in Stanton, by Gender & Age:

**Extended Foster Care (EFC) Program: Non-Minor Dependents**

- The EFC Program, created by Assembly Bill 12 in January, 2012, allows foster youth to receive foster care benefits and services after age 18 and up to age 21. These young adults remain under the jurisdiction of the court and supervision of the county as they transition to independence.
- There are 2 Non-Minor Dependents residing within the city of Stanton as of 12/31/2013

**How can the Stanton Community help to Preserve and Reunite their Children and Families?**

- Support community-based responses to protect children and preserve families
- Become a resource family and encourage others to do so (short or longer term foster care)
- Participate in team decision making meetings that bring together people to help children at risk
- Provide space for foster care orientation, training or family visitation
- Help with community mentoring for birth parents working towards reunification
