## Population<sup>1</sup>

- Fullerton is the 7th most populous city in Orange County: 135,161
- Ethnic breakdown: 38.2% White; 34.4% Hispanic; 22.6% Asian; 2.1% Black; 2.8% Other
- Fullerton has the 7th greatest youth (0-17) population when compared to other OC cities: 31,558
- Median Family Income: \$76,187 ([Orange County: \$85,472] [U.S. Census Bureau - American Fact Finder 2014 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates])

## Social Services

- Fullerton children receiving financial assistance through CalWORKs<sup>2</sup>: 1839
  - Representing 4.29% of the 42,905 child recipients county-wide (12/2014)
- Child Abuse and neglect reports on children received from Fullerton in 2015: 2,462
  - Representing 4.73% of the 52,057 reports received county-wide

## Child Abuse and Neglect Report Details

- The majority of the 2,462 reports came from mandated professions (89%); Counselor/Therapist (23%), School Personnel/Teachers (20%), Other Professionals combined (27%), Law Enforcement (21%), and SSA, Probation, other Government Agency (10%). Non-mandated but concerned parties (including relatives) made 267 reports, equal to 11% of the total.
- The 2,462 report-allegations represent 1661 distinct children<sup>3</sup> in Fullerton, by Gender & Age:

**Extended Foster Care (EFC) Program: Non-Minor Dependents**

- The EFC Program, created by Assembly Bill 12 in January, 2012, allows foster youth to receive foster care benefits and services after age 18 and up to age 21. These young adults remain under the jurisdiction of the court and supervision of the county as they transition to independence.
- There are 26 Non-Minor Dependents residing within the city of Fullerton as of 12/31/2015

**How can the Fullerton Community help to Preserve and Reunite their Children and Families?**

- Support community-based responses to protect children and preserve families
- Become a resource family and encourage others to do so (short or longer term foster care)
- Participate in team decision making meetings that bring together people to help children at risk
- Provide space for foster care orientation, training or family visitation
- Help with community mentoring for birth parents working towards reunification
