## Population<sup>1</sup>

- Irvine is the 3rd most populous city in Orange County: 212,375
- Ethnic breakdown: 45.1% White; 9.2% Hispanic; 39.0% Asian; 1.6% Black; 5.0% Other
- Irvine has the 3rd greatest youth (0-17) population when compared to other OC cities: 45,675
- Median Family Income: \$109,956 ([Orange County: \$85,472] [U.S. Census Bureau - American Fact Finder 2014 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates])

## Social Services

- Irvine children receiving financial assistance through CalWORKs<sup>2</sup>: 820
  - Representing 1.91% of the 42,905 child recipients county-wide (12/2014)
- Child Abuse and neglect reports on children received from Irvine in 2015: 2,084
  - Representing 4.0% of the 52,057 reports received county-wide

## Child Abuse and Neglect Report Details

- The majority of the 2,084 reports came from mandated professions (88%); Counselor/Therapist (22%), School Personnel/Teachers (24%), Other Professionals combined (20%), Law Enforcement (27%), and SSA, Probation, other Government Agency (7%). Non-mandated but concerned parties (including relatives) made 253 reports, equal to 12% of the total.
- The 2,084 report-allegations represent 1481 distinct children<sup>3</sup> in Irvine, by Gender & Age:

**Extended Foster Care (EFC) Program: Non-Minor Dependents**

- The EFC Program, created by Assembly Bill 12 in January, 2012, allows foster youth to receive foster care benefits and services after age 18 and up to age 21. These young adults remain under the jurisdiction of the court and supervision of the county as they transition to independence.
- There are 3 Non-Minor Dependents residing within the city of Irvine as of 12/31/2015

**How can the Irvine Community help to Preserve and Reunite their Children and Families?**

- Support community-based responses to protect children and preserve families
- Become a resource family and encourage others to do so (short or longer term foster care)
- Participate in team decision making meetings that bring together people to help children at risk
- Provide space for foster care orientation, training or family visitation
- Help with community mentoring for birth parents working towards reunification
