## Population<sup>1</sup>

- Santa Ana is the 2nd most populous city in Orange County: 324,528
- Ethnic breakdown: 9.2% White; 78.2% Hispanic; 10.4% Asian; 1.0% Black; 1.2% Other
- Santa Ana has the 1st greatest youth (0-17) population when compared to other OC cities: 99,678
- Median Family Income: \$50,505 ([Orange County: \$85,472] [U.S. Census Bureau - American Fact Finder 2014 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates])

## Social Services

- Santa Ana children receiving financial assistance through CalWORKs<sup>2</sup>: 11,760
  - Representing 27.41% of the 42,905 child recipients county-wide (12/2014)
- Child Abuse and neglect reports on children received from Santa Ana in 2015: 10,508
  - Representing 20.19% of the 52,057 reports received county-wide

## Child Abuse and Neglect Report Details

- The majority of the 10,508 reports came from mandated professions (89%); Counselor/Therapist (29%), School Personnel/Teachers (28%), Other Professionals combined (23%), Law Enforcement (9%), and SSA, Probation, other Government Agency (11%). Non-mandated but concerned parties (including relatives) made 1,169 reports, equal to 11% of the total.
- The 10,508 report-allegations represent 6778 distinct children<sup>3</sup> in Santa Ana, by Gender & Age:

**Extended Foster Care (EFC) Program: Non-Minor Dependents**

- The EFC Program, created by Assembly Bill 12 in January, 2012, allows foster youth to receive foster care benefits and services after age 18 and up to age 21. These young adults remain under the jurisdiction of the court and supervision of the county as they transition to independence.
- There are 38 Non-Minor Dependents residing within the city of Santa Ana as of 12/31/2015

**How can the Santa Ana Community help to Preserve and Reunite their Children and Families?**

- Support community-based responses to protect children and preserve families
- Become a resource family and encourage others to do so (short or longer term foster care)
- Participate in team decision making meetings that bring together people to help children at risk
- Provide space for foster care orientation, training or family visitation
- Help with community mentoring for birth parents working towards reunification
