Population¹

- Aliso Viejo is the 21st most populous city in Orange County: 49,829
- Ethnic breakdown: Asian 15.5%, Black 2.3%, Hispanic 17.3%, White 59.3%, Native American 0.2%, Other 5.4%.
- Aliso Viejo has the 20th greatest youth population (0-17yrs) when compared to other OC cities: 12,906
- Median Family Income: \$121,309 ([Orange County: \$86,003])

Social Services²

- Aliso Viejo children receiving financial assistance through CalWORKs: 129
- Representing 0.3% of the 38,505 child recipients county-wide (1/2016)

Child Abuse and Neglect Report Details

- Number of children reported for abuse and neglect from Aliso Viejo in year 2016: 457
- Representing 0.94% of the 48,732 reports received county-wide
- The majority of the 457 reports came from mandated professions (89%):
Counselor/Therapist (25%), School Personnel/Teachers (24%), Other Professionals combined (21%),
Law Enforcement (26%), and SSA, Probation, other Government Agency (4%).
Non-mandated (concerned parties, including relatives) made 49 reports, equal to 11% of the total.
- The 457 reported-allegations represent 330 distinct children in Aliso Viejo, identified below by Gender & Age:

Extended Foster Care (EFC) Program: Non-Minor Dependents

The EFC Program, created by Assembly Bill 12 in January, 2012, allows foster youth to receive foster care benefits and services after age 18 and up to age 21. These young adults remain under the jurisdiction of the court and supervision of the county as they transition to independence.
