Population¹

- Los Alamitos is the 33rd most populous city in Orange County: 11,658
- Ethnic breakdown: Asian 13.1%, Black 3.2%, Hispanic 23.2%, White 52.8%, Native American 0.5%, Other 7.2%.
- Los Alamitos has the 32nd greatest youth population (0-17yrs) when compared to other OC cities: 2,856
- Median Family Income: \$90,054 ([Orange County: \$86,003])

Social Services²

- Los Alamitos children receiving financial assistance through CalWORKs: 87
- Representing 0.2% of the 38,505 child recipients county-wide (1/2016)

Child Abuse and Neglect Report Details

- Number of children reported for abuse and neglect from Los Alamitos in 2016: 164
- Representing 0.34% of the 48,732 reports received county-wide
- The majority of the 164 reports came from mandated professions (87%); Counselor/Therapist (13%), School Personnel/Teachers (27%), Other Professionals combined (30%), Law Enforcement (20%), and SSA, Probation, other Government Agency (11%). Non-mandated but concerned parties (including relatives) made 22 reports, equal to 13% of the total.
- The 164 reported-allegations represent 139 distinct children in Los Alamitos, identified below by Gender & Age:

Extended Foster Care (EFC) Program: Non-Minor Dependents

The EFC Program, created by Assembly Bill 12 in January, 2012, allows foster youth to receive foster care benefits and services after age 18 and up to age 21. These young adults remain under the jurisdiction of the court and supervision of the county as they transition to independence.
