Population¹

- Newport Beach is the 11th most populous city in Orange County: 86,911
- Ethnic breakdown: Asian 8.4%, Black 0.4%, Hispanic 8.3%, White 80.1%, Native American 0.2%, Other 2.6%.
- Newport Beach has the 17th greatest youth population (0-17yrs) when compared to other OC cities: 15,383
- Median Family Income: \$154,456 ([Orange County: \$86,003])

Social Services²

- Newport Beach children receiving financial assistance through CalWORKs: 104
- Representing 0.3% of the 38,505 child recipients county-wide (1/2016)

Child Abuse and Neglect Report Details

- Number of children reported for abuse and neglect from Newport Beach in 2016: 588
- Representing 1.21% of the 48,732 reports received county-wide
- The majority of the 588 reports came from mandated professions (86%); Counselor/Therapist (24%), School Personnel/Teachers (25%), Other Professionals combined (23%), Law Enforcement (23%), and SSA, Probation, other Government Agency (6%). Non-mandated but concerned parties (including relatives) made 85 reports, equal to 14% of the total.
- The 588 reported-allegations represent 441 distinct children in Newport Beach, identified below by Gender & Age:

Extended Foster Care (EFC) Program: Non-Minor Dependents

The EFC Program, created by Assembly Bill 12 in January, 2012, allows foster youth to receive foster care benefits and services after age 18 and up to age 21. These young adults remain under the jurisdiction of the court and supervision of the county as they transition to independence.

■ There are 1 Non-Minor Dependents residing within the city of Newport Beach as of 12/31/2016
